The Eglingham Parish Council currently has three vacancies for the office of Councillor which it would like to fill by co-option.

The parish council works towards community wellbeing and providing services at a local level. It is the tier of local government closest to the people. Parish Councillors are residents who give up a little of their time each week to represent the interests of the local community. Ideally, a parish council reflects the community it serves, so all sorts of people of different ages, backgrounds, skills and work experiences can play their part.

As a councillor representing the communities of Eglingham and South Charlton you will help keep it a great place to live and work. You will be supported in your role and training will be provided. You should be comfortable using email and Zoom, have a positive outlook, a can-do attitude and be willing to work as part of a team.

To be eligible candidates must be aged 18 years or older and must, in addition, either be on the Electoral Roll of the Parish or, during the whole of the past 12 months, have either lived in the Parish, owned or leased land in the Parish, worked in the Parish, or lived within three miles of it.

Covid business support grants

Teams have been working through the guidance and information required to put in place processes to take applications for the business support grants which have been announced by Government over recent weeks.

Northumberland County Council are very pleased to have been able to open the first grant type for applications from Friday 13 November. This is the Local Restrictions Support Grant (Closed) Addendum scheme - and is for businesses which have been required by law to close during the current national lockdown.

The next grant to launch, will be the Local Restrictions Support Grant (Open) - which is for businesses in the hospitality, hotel, bed and breakfast and leisure industry which remained open but were severely affected by the Local Covid Alert Level: HIGH restrictions.

A further scheme to support those businesses which were required to close in March and have never been able to re-open, for example nightclubs, will also be opened as soon as possible.

The council will also receive a one-off payment which can be used to support businesses which have been impacted but are not able to be supported by the grants above or wider Government support. Proposals for this are currently being developed.

On that page there is also a wide range of additional information aimed at supporting businesses during these difficult times.

Enforcement activity

NCC enforcement teams are continuing to work with businesses across the county, taking a proactive approach to provide advice and guidance, to make sure they are ready to reopen safely when the current restrictions end. The team have undertaken 600 operational visits since early November, and plan to continue this programme of work over the coming weeks. Work also continues with Northumbria Police and action will be taken is there is blatant disregard to the current restrictions.

As previously mentioned, there is concern around the level of footfall within our towns and villages, with more businesses now able to maintain an operating position and trade in some way eg click and collect, in this second national lockdown.

Since 2 November, the team have received over 200 enquiries on the new legislation, with around 130 seeking clarification on their interpretation of this, and some 80 complaints about those who are trading.

Isolation payments are also available to residents who are required to self-isolate - further information and eligibility critieria is available on the Council's website.

Seasonal Recipe

My family was strictly teetotal so I was late discovering alcohol!

One recipe I came across was called **Raspberry MacRomanoff** but also appears in some cookery books as **Cream Crowdie**

- 2 oz medium oatmeal
- 10 fl oz double cream
- 4 tbsp clear honey
- 3 tbsp whisky
- 12 oz fresh or frozen raspberries
- 1. Lightly toast the oatmeal in a dry pan
- 2. Cool for 15 mins
- 3. Whip cream to soft peaks then gently fold in honey, whisky and oatmeal
- 4. (the whisky could be optional???)
- 5. Reserve. Few raspberries but layer raspberries and cream mixture in four sundae glasses
- 6. Cover with cling film and refrigerate for at least an hour
- 7. Bring to room temperature for 39 minutes
- 8. Decorate with remaining raspberries

UPDATE on Ultrafast Broadband for proposed SHIPLEY CFP Residents & Businesses

Some time ago, 26 properties in the Shipley area, were submitted in a Community Fibre Project (CFP) request to Openreach for a quotation for the installation of Fibre to the Premises (FTTP). The quotation was prepared and returned in May 2020 to the Community Lead. As there is no longer a Community Lead, it is possible that the quotation may not have been shared with all 26 householders in the original CFP. The quote issued on May 13th, 2020 to connect all 26 properties was £125,721 and would have required almost all of the available 26 householder / business vouchers to cover the cost in order for the CFP scheme to be financially viable. In the meantime, and given the lengthy wait time for the outcome of the CFP Openreach quote, a number Shipley homeowners may have opted to use their Gigabyte Vouchers with a local provider delivering wireless broadband and are no longer interested in FTTP. Gigabyte Vouchers already used with a wireless provider cannot be used again towards a CFP scheme.

PLEASE return your form to the Parish Clerk

It would really help the Parish Council to focus their efforts with iNorthumberland to know exactly how many Shipley residents are still interested in pursuing options for faster broadband. It would also be extremely helpful to hear from those of you who have already made your own arrangements with a wireless or a 4G provider.

To this end the Parish Clerk has written to all 26 properties included in the original CFP to ask for a response by December 9th 2020. You can return your form either by post or email to the, Eglingham Parish Clerk, Lesley Long. eglinghamclerk@gmail.com

One thing that has not changed in 2020 is the steady stream of us canines needing a rescue bed at Patterson's Cottage. Whatever the reason - our own (expensive) ill health or that of our humans. family circumstances or the work of NCC Dog Wardens - we keep coming. There have been 52 admissions so far. Fortunately the supply of lovely people looking for a furry addition to the family has been almost equal to the flow; there have been 48 adoptions in the first 11 months of the year. Every one of your pawthors in 2020 found a permanent home - Chance the lurcher, George from Wooler, all those terriers, hairy Rosie, teenage Zeus, Big Barney, elegant Archie, Miss Big Tongue Ella and Simba the unrepentant terrier.



That wasn't me dropping the hint in by the way –I still need a bit of coaching on this "being a companion" thing. My first human wanted me to catch wildlife so I react to small furry critters and – seeing as I wasn't what you'd call a natural at that sort of work – I'm still fearful of people standing over me. I've learnt to travel in a car and can do walking on a lead so maybe next year...

All of this board, lodging, veterinary attention and trust-building personal development has a cost though. In terms of fundraising I'm told it has been a very difficult nine months, so many activities like the pop up cafés, local shows and street collections were impossible. Thanks to you lovely people, donations and re-sale through the shop and online were great until everything closed again. They're ready to go with a full Christmas theme at the shop in Wooler during December if we get the go-ahead. If all goes well we will also be open on Sunday 6th as part of Wooler Christmas Market.

GOVERMENT GIGABIT SCHEME

The Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme is open until March 2021 and aims to future proof people's internet connections for a generation.

The scheme is being targeted at rural, hard-to-reach areas that aren't likely to be connected through the commercial rollout of gigabit networks soon.

This is the site to register addresses to obtain a quote from Openreach: https:// www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband/community-fibre-partnerships. Homes and businesses with broadband speeds of less than 100Mbps can use vouchers to support the cost of installing new gigabit-capable connections when part of a group scheme. Group projects are when two or more residents and/or SMEs get together to combine their youchers towards the shared cost of installation.
